### **Parish Council News**

#### **Parish Councillors update**

Since the last newsletter, several parish councillors, have for a variety of reasons, resigned. The chairman and all remaining councillors would like to express their thanks to these people, who gave up their valuable time to help on this important council. Most of the vacancies have been filled, although we still have one vacancy to fill. The two most recent appointments are, William Cook and Chris Potter who join, Ros Eaton, Jos Leeder, Paula Warner, Cathy Newby, Judith Wyndham and Brian Hunt, who is still chairman.

#### **County Councillor**

Patricia O'Brien, our county councillor, has announced that she will not be standing at the May election. Patricia has been a great help to NPC over the years, attending many of our meetings, giving support and advice when asked and supporting many of our projects with money from her Locality Budget. The Parish Council is very grateful for all these things and we wish her well.

#### **Parish Clerk**

In November, our Parish Clerk, Sue Brown, retired from the post. While no public gathering was allowed, we were able to thank her and to give her a gift from the councillors for her excellent and reliable service over many years. Her replacement, Clare Lucas, is now well established and proving to be very efficient and an asset to the council. We hope that she has a long and successful time with NPC.

#### **Parish Council Meetings**

As has been the case for almost a year, the March meeting will be held by Zoom. It has been agreed that the APM meeting and the AGM will be held on the same evening, namely May 26<sup>th</sup>. While restrictions will remain, we must wait to see as to whether councillors will actually be able to gather in one place. Information on this meeting will be displayed in the usual ways.

#### Vehicle Activated Sign

As some will have noted, the VAS disappeared for some time. It had a mechanical problem which was sorted and at the same time it was updated with a Bluetooth connection. The data from the VAS is collected monthly and if there is clearly a problem with speeding vehicles particularly at specific times, the police will be informed. It is expected that they would then come and investigate.

#### Dog fouling

It has come to our attention that dog owners are not clearing up after their dogs, particularly in The Street. This is clearly unacceptable to the community at large. Please could we ask if this is seen that either that person is spoken to directly or the information is passed on to a councillor? Thank you.

#### Sizewell C

There are issues that will impact on our parish about the planning proposals associated with this massive building project. A major concern is the proposed lorry distribution park on the old Felixstowe Road near to the Levington turn-off. At peak 500+ lorries a day could be going there and back from the A14/A12 interchange. This would mean passing the crematorium, crossing the cycle path from Ipswich to Felixstowe and turning right onto the Felixstowe Road. The parish council will continue to raise its concerns at the various meetings that are called.

#### Flooding

Some improvements have been made by Suffolk Highways in order to alleviate flooding under the bridge. The drains under the bridge and along the road will now be emptied four times a year, rather than once, which was the case. To solve the problem completely would involve considerable costs, which for now remain out of reach.

### Victoria Field

Since the responses to the questionnaire that was sent out last year, a small but hard-working committee has met on several occasions to discuss the ideas that were raised. These are the ideas that are now being progressed:

#### A. Footpath

The plan is to remove a section of the hedge to allow pedestrians to walk safely along a new path set back from the road. A new hedge would be put inside the current one. The new hedge would be planted before any removal. This would both improve the safety of those wishing to cross the road and improve the visibility of car drivers wishing to turn into Ipswich Road from The Street.

#### B. Information Board

This would be put near an entrance gate and would have information both about Victoria Field and Paupers' Wood on it. Information about the giving of the land would be included.

#### C. Village Sign

The proposal is to have a competition to design a suitable sign. Residents as well as pupils from both schools would be invited to enter. Neutral judges would be sought.

#### D. Wildlife area

Various ideas have been put forward. Some of these include having hedgehog houses and bug houses. Bulbs and wild flowers to be planted in some areas. It is agreed that no more trees are required, although replacements might have to be considered in the future.

#### E. Seating

To add around 2 or 3 picnic type circular benches. These might be made from recycled plastic, that looks like wood and is therefore almost maintenance free.

#### F. Community Bench

These are popular, but expensive. It is hoped that a local carpenter might become involved.

#### G. Play equipment

This would be located near the bus shelter. A trim trail for adults and older children or an adventure trail for younger children appears to be the choice. No final decision has yet been made as to the best option to go for. The next step is to decide upon the exact size and therefore what can be put in that area.

#### H. Maintenance plan

There are several tasks that need to be undertaken within the village and, to a large extent, it is the few that complete these tasks. A yearly plan has been created listing all that the parish council would like to see covered. The plan will be managed by two people, who will seek volunteers and by so doing create a positive community spirit by getting residents involved as much as possible.

Whilst none of this is cheap, some funds have been successfully sourced. More remains to be done. Comments and thoughts about these proposals can be sent to the parish clerk.

# **Priory Court**



To say that 2020 was a difficult year would be an understatement, but despite the difficulties, some matters have progressed.

The Court was quick to recognise the value of our community, and we established a list of those happy to help during the times of "lock down"- thanks must go to those who helped out with essential shopping, collecting medicines, arranging newspaper deliveries and generally " keeping an eye out" for those needing a bit of extra help.

The village sign received funding from the Enabling Communities Budget Scheme and was installed in the summer. Many have asked about the design of the sign and what it shows so here goes. The circular element reflects the "circle of friendship" as well as the circular road around the Court. The building is of course the centre of Priory Park, the clubhouse, as seen from the car park. The two curved lines reflect the flowing river Orwell and the leaves on top reflect the woods that surround us. Finally, look carefully, and you will see a monk-like figure at the top and that is the link to the

original monks of the priory that once stood here. The idea of the sign was to enhance the sense of arrival to the Court.

Nacton Parish Council used funds from the District Councillors' budget for a new PCRA notice board to replace the existing one that was, literally, falling apart-it looks very smart indeed.

The Lane started off the year with all good intentions from Ipswich Borough Council, but these were quickly thwarted by the March lockdown and the planned inspection in May could not happen but eventually did in October. The increased use of The Lane by those accessing Orwell Country Park and Bridge Wood has added to the damage and is equally adding to the dilemma that IBC has in terms of its legal obligation to maintain The Lane; discussions continue with IBC on its future.



The Court celebrated VE Day in May with a socially distanced 'party' outside of many homes - much fun was had by all and spirits were lifted.

We all missed the MacMillan Coffee morning in 2020 but undeterred, Linda Pratt organised a collection from the Court and the Lodges and the magnificent sum of £510 was collected for MacMillan; well done Linda and all who contributed. Our usual 'Carols at the Club' could not take place so to make sure the Court celebrated Christmas, Mike Norris, dressed as Santa, rode round the Court on his scooter ringing a bell and wishing all a very happy Christmas. With the New Year comes hope for a return to some normality; let's hope so!

## St Martin's church

Tuesday 16th March 2021 was the first anniversary of the National COVID Lockdown and it is only now that we are beginning to see the possibility of returning to something resembling the life we had before the lockdown. It has been a very challenging year for so many people and in so many different ways and it is going to take some time to fully recover. But, we are on the road to recovery, and throughout the COVID crisis our benefice of eight churches achieved a great deal.

This has been particularly evident in the fact that whilst many parish churches across England have remained closed since the end of November 2020 (and many will not be opening until Easter), due to the hard work of our churchwardens and the commitment of our Ministry Team, all of the churches in our benefice have remained open for Sunday services and for private prayer during the week. In December, we had 24 public acts of worship (mostly on Sundays) across the benefice and the total number of people who attended these services was 414. In January, we had 16 public acts of worship (all on Sundays) across the benefice and the total number of people who attended these services was 160. In February, we had 11 public acts of worship (all on Sundays) across the benefice and the total number of people who attended these services was 140. (Snow and very cold weather meant that some were reluctant to attend - however, on Sunday 28th February, we had 62 people in total at our services.) This has been a considerable achievement. However, in addition to the above, since the beginning of the lockdown in March 2020, we have continuously published weekly sermons and acts of worship, completed by me and Rev Sarah, which are circulated widely by email (possibly reaching more than 400 people) and Facebook in both written form and as a recording. We also post the printed material to parishioners who do not have access to the internet. The excellent initiative devised and edited by Janet and Harry Stalker, of creating a weekly Newsletter at the beginning of the first lockdown, has also been sent out weekly by email, Facebook and by post and, again, this has been greatly appreciated. Throughout these past few months, a pattern of worship across our churches is beginning to develop where each church now has two services a month with one of these services being Holy Communion. However, on Easter Sunday, there will be a service at 10am at each of our churches and there will be Holy Communion at the three of our largest churches, Bucklesham, Kirton and Nacton. Of course, as Easter is on 4th April, the usual COVID restrictions will still be in place with the need to book a place at a service, wear face masks and sanitise hands. Even so, there will be 98 places available for Holy Communion across the three churches, and 83 places for the Morning Prayer at the other five churches. The booking procedure for these will be published in the usual way.

The hope of Easter has never been more significant as we begin to see the possibility of returning to something resembling the life we had before the lockdown. Of course, like the new life of Easter, it won't be the same, but like the new life of Easter, it has the promise of being something far better.

2020 - what a year! For us on the farm the pandemic threw up challenges but also several opportunities. With more meals being eaten at home and 90% of our income coming from sales to supermarkets, we have seen increased demand for both our conventional and organic vegetables. This has resulted in the lowest levels of product wasted in the field that I can recall in my 23 years at Home Farm.

The real winners, and don't ask me why, have been onions, leeks and brassicas. Meanwhile the potato market has been trickier, with the loss of many sales to chip shops and processors who serve the catering industry weighing heavily on the rest of the trade.

I have to be honest though and say that the weather - and hasn't it always been so in farming - has had more impact on the farm than Covid. The very dry spring and early summer had a devasting effect on those crops that can rarely be affordable to irrigate. Those being barley, wheat and sugar beet. Yields of these were down by anything from 40% - 70%; the only blessing for us is that these crops, though important, do not make up a large part of the farm's income. Parishioners may have seen in the local press that we are part of the Felixstowe Hydrocycle Group. We are all farmers who, with the help of an EU grant, have invested in a pipeline from the Kings Fleet at Falkenham marshes to Bucklesham. Fresh water that was being pumped out in a damaging fashion to the River Deben is now being pumped back up the peninsular and into reservoirs for use later in the year enabling irrigation of valuable vegetable crops.

Finally, our environmental and wildlife areas that consist of wild bird seed, insect and pollinator mixes are looking very tired now and we plan to cultivate and reinstate these in the late spring as is good practice. So with any luck we may just be able to bring some wildflower colours to the village as we all venture out from lock down. Andrew Williams *Home Farm Director*.



# Nacton & Bucklesham Under 5s

What a strange year it has been. Preschool closed in the first lockdown in March and reopened again at the beginning of June. We kept in contact with the children and their families via our new Instagram page, where we shared daily activities. Our return in June prompted all sorts of new challenges and procedures for us to implement including bubbles, enhanced cleaning and staffing. We were kept sane by the children's enthusiasm and smiley faces. We have been open ever since.

Early years settings had little guidance and no extra financial support. Most sessions were outside meaning we had healthier children using fewer and more natural resources. It highlighted the inventiveness and imagination of children and resulted in amazing play and learning. Staff also responded well and adapted to different ways of teaching and working.

We have relied heavily on the village halls' generosity and donations from the local community. Going forward we are looking at ways of making preschool more sustainable and viable for the future.

### **Tree warden**

A further 10 metre section of hedgerow on The Street side of Victoria Field has been cleared and replanted. As before, all vegetation except mature hawthorn has been removed. The coppiced hawthorn provides a framework for inter-planting with native hedgerow species, supplied by the Woodland Trust through the Suffolk Tree Warden Network.

In the Paupers' Wood work continues to thin, coppice or remove weaker, damaged and dead trees which are used to provide woodchip to improve the pathway. This work will continue during the coming months, taking care not to disturb nesting birds. A short section of failing hedgerow along The Street has been replaced using native hawthorn, again provided free of charge by the Woodland Trust.

Hedges provide cover and food for a number of species of nesting birds, in particular blackbird, chaffinch, green finch and wren. It is an offence under *Section 1 of the Wildlife and Countryside Act of 1981* to kill, injure or take any wild bird; take, damage or destroy the nest of a wild bird and take or destroy the egg of a wild bird. Therefore, it is an offence to cut a hedge, knowing there is a

nest present. Always check your hedges thoroughly before trimming! DEFRA recommend that hedge maintenance is avoided between March and August."

# **Orwell Park School**



This term has been our second term of OPS Online and Zoom lessons and our children and teachers have worked together to ensure that we have maintained a full curriculum in the last few weeks but also, through Tutor groups, assemblies and Chapel, provided pastoral and spiritual support within a connected community.

Many of our Year 8 pupils have been involved in scholarship attempts of one type or another and I am delighted to report that 20 awards have been achieved to local and national senior schools to date.

A winter lockdown has provided new challenges with regards to sport; however, once again, the pupils have engaged in PE and Games sessions with enthusiasm and energy. We have had over 80 Prep pupils partaking in the Strava 'ROOL' (Running Out Of Lockdown) Challenge. A total of nearly 3000km have been covered. The Pre-Prep have had a Strava challenge as well and they have managed over 200 miles during the first half of term.

The resilience of the Music Department continues to impress; since the start of term we have had individual music lessons each week, some small and even medium-sized Ensemble rehearsals, and performances recorded at home, and celebrated in Assembly. Our collective focus is fixed firmly on the Spring Concert, as well as what might be possible beforehand, including Associated Board exams.

We have also enjoyed celebrating the wonderful artwork being produced by the children this term, with nominations for Artist of the Week mentioned in Headmaster's Assembly. The Eco-Committee has also continued to meet this term and we have run an Eco-Superstar competition for OPS pupils and their families.

The boarding house has been open for a select group of children, who, for various reasons, have required boarding this term. As well as the occasional TV shows and films, the children have completed some jigsaw puzzles, learned Monopoly, built a marble run and some have even learned how to knit! At the weekends, they have built campfires, run themselves ragged playing in the sports hall, explored the grounds and taken advantage of snow-covered playing fields. The virtual Orangery Lectures continue to offer a wide variety of themes and a highlight this half-term was *What impact has Covid-19 had on learning experiences and how might this change education in the future?* by Old Orwellian Professor Roger Murphy, University of Nottingham.

All children returned to school on 8<sup>th</sup> March and it has been wonderful to see the children enjoying the grounds and spending time with their friends. It is a year since the first lockdown and as a school we marked the National Day of Reflection on 23<sup>rd</sup> March with a minute's silence. It is with cautious optimism that we look forward to greater normality next term and beyond.
